His main interest was the subject of English Literature and he corresponded with such well known authors as Henry Miller and Lawrence Durrell. When he died many of his books were sold at auction by Sotheby's and one in particular, James Joyce's *Ulysses*, went, would you believe it, for £7,000 – a far cry from the £5 he spent on it many years earlier.

I have 12 bookcases in my home, more books are stored in the third bedroom and even more in the conservatory. My main interests are Natural History – in my childhood and youth I studied birds and butterflies – and, of course, Local History,

I have spent several hours compiling such a list. The number exceeds more than 270 although I have to admit this number does include other printed material relating to our lovely old town. The subjects are extremely varied and many of the books have been researched and written by our own members.

Among those listed are a number of guides to the town produced by the former Hitchin Urban District Council and these make fascinating reading as they show how Hitchin has developed down the years.

In addition to local books I also collect picture postcards of the town and I have quite a number dating back to the reign of King Edward VII. The street scenes are instantly recognisable in quite a number of cases as the buildings shown are still with us today. Very few postcards are printed now and any I come across I eagerly buy.

### **A Good Day Out – Hertfordshire Association for Local History - Pauline Humphries/ Bridget Howlett**

Even leaden skies didn't dampen the anticipation of Society members as they set off for Woolmer Green in November. Two cars loaded with HHS "stalwarts" and associated stall material and stock were on their way to the 40<sup>th</sup> Annual Symposium of the Hertfordshire Association for Local History, the county-wide "get-together" for local historians.

The programme promised a menu of speakers in support of the theme "Local History, Landscape and Archaeology", and we were delighted to find that three of the nine were well-known to us, featuring regularly in our HHS programme and two more are due to speak to us in 2020. The opening talk by Kris Lockyear, "History, Archaeology, Local History: a strained relationship?" encapsulated the day's theme, which subsequent speakers were able to comprehensively question and demolish. Talk after talk demonstrated how vital a melding of all three fields of expertise was in understanding the significance of their particular sites.

Tom Williamson and Anne Rowe respectively delved into archaeology and garden history at Gobions and elsewhere and at Henry VIII's fishponds at Hunsdon. We discovered the Swiss Cottage in Cassiobury Park. We dug a medieval tile kiln at Puckeridge and staked out the foundations of the Old County Gaol in Hertford. Keith Fitzpatrick-Matthews summed it up beautifully with his "Why Local Historians need to be archaeologically literate". The afternoon ended with a very interesting item on ethical metal detecting and the uncovering of the Kelshall Hoard by Phil Kirk.

In all, a rewarding and well-organised day, with an opportunity for local societies to get together and share their experiences, run stalls and mount displays. If this has whetted your appetite, why not join us next November in Tewin? Although the theme is yet to be announced, I'm sure that you won't be disappointed.
