WEBSITE EDITOR

HITCHIN'S CONSERVATION AREAS

Over ten years ago, in 2009-10, the Society helped with a thorough review of Hitchin's Conservation Area. This was first designated in 1969 with the aim of safeguarding the historic character of the town centre at a time when modern 'development' was accelerating. The town is a living organism and has to change in order to survive but it is important that decisions on such changes are made in a context fully aware of Hitchin's undoubted importance as a classic 'historic market town'. The Conservation Area acts as vital background for the deliberations of the local authorities' planners and, ideally, for those proposing changes too.

The original Conservation Area was reviewed in 1997-98 but it was soon clear that further work was needed. The re-examination of 2009-10 was ably coordinated by a firm of architectural and planning specialists (The Conservation Studio) who consulted widely and held information events on possible alterations to the Area. The result of these deliberations was the adoption, in 2011, of a set of new Conservation Area frameworks -

- * Hitchin Conservation Area (the main Town Centre area)
- * Hitchin Butts Close Conservation Area
- * Hitchin Hill Path Conservation Area
- * Hitchin Railway and Ransom's Recreation Ground Conservation Area
- * Hitchin Register of Buildings of Local Interest

At the time much attention was rightly paid to the review exercise, its successful conclusion, and its formal adoption as policy by North Hertfordshire District Council. Some recent discussions on local developments have highlighted, however, that that profile is no longer as high as it should be. The Society has decided, therefore, to include the set of very useful, and statutorily based, 2011 Conservation Area documents in our Website Links section for wider and more accessible access; the link is also listed here – northherts.gov.uk/hitchin-conservation-area.

WILLIAM WILSHERE'S HITCHIN FARM AND GARDEN, 1809-1824

Edited by Bridget Howlett and with an Introduction


A book launch is to be held at the British Schools Museum at 5pm.on Thursday 14 March 2024 when Bridget Howlett will give a short talk and drinks and nibbles will be served. A small charge of £3 to cover costs will be made. See the British Schools website for further information.

William Wilshere (1754-1824) was a Hitchin lawyer chiefly remembered as the founder of the Hitchin British Schools. According to William Lucas, the Quaker brewer, Wilshere 'began life with but little property but by his address, assiduity & superior abilities - - - acquired much wealth & influence' becoming 'the most eminent public character of this town & neighbourhood.' He 'was very kind to the poor'. By his later years Wilshere was farming about 120 acres, mainly to the east of the town, principally for arable crops. This volume contains transcripts of Wilshere's *Farm and Gardening Memoranda* spanning the years 1809 to 1824.

Not only do the memoranda shed light on up-to-date agriculture on the Hertfordshire chalklands in the early nineteenth century, but also show that Wilshere was clearly farming with an eye to the local urban market. He grew not only wheat, barley and fodder, but also large quantities of crops such as carrots and potatoes, while pigs and poultry loom large - aspects of contemporary agriculture all too frequently ignored by historians. The wealth of varieties named - especially of potatoes - is unusual and Wilshere's comments on such things as the cultivation of canary seed and on keeping turkeys are also of some significance.

Garden historians will find much to interest them. As well as providing useful lists of varieties, Wilshere records the local and London based nurseries from which his plants were obtained. Also included in the volume is the Journal kept by Wilshere's gardener, James Bowie, from 1812 until 1814 with a 'List of Trees, Seeds etc Sown, planted etc in the Garden of William Wilshere Esq. at Hitchin, Herts, by James Bowie 1813'. Bowie left Wilshere in August 1814 when sent by Sir Joseph Banks on a plant hunting expedition to Brazil and South Africa. Bills listing plants supplied by Robert Murray of Hertford and Henry Hodgson of Hitchin have also been transcribed. Together, these sources provide vital insights into the gardening activities of a middle-class individual, at a time when most of our evidence for garden history relates to the properties of large landowners.

The first part of the Introduction by Bridget Howlett provides historical detail on both Wilshere and Hitchin. Tom Williamson, Professor of Landscape History at the University of East Anglia, sets the memoranda in their local and national contexts. Biographical Notes of local people, a Glossary, Bibliography and comprehensive Indexes of Names, Places and Subjects and full colour images of maps of Wilshere's properties drawn up in c1808 and 1818, are also included.
